## 2. SUSTAINABILITY AT THE ROOST



Being environmentally friendly is important to us personally and we wanted to ensure that the Roost was as sustainable and environmentally friendly as possible whilst still being comfortable for our guests, all year round.

In developing the Roost, we focused on a number of key elements which we felt could lower the environmental impact of the business.

#### So, what do we do to make the Roost sustainable?

#### > SOLAR POWER:

We're an electric only site and at the end of 2022 we installed solar panels and battery storage to help offset the site's energy usage (and growing bills). Hot water runs off an insulated hot water tank which, no matter the number of guests on site, generates and stores lovely hot water for the showers and kitchens.

#### > RAINWATER HARVESTING:

We have rainwater storage tanks. The water stored is used to flush loos, wash bikes and water the garden saving a considerable amount of drinking water. If the tanks run low, our rainwater back up system switches to mains so we never run out.

#### > ENERGY AND WATER EFFICIENT SHOWER ROOMS:

The shower rooms have push button showers and taps to limit water wastage and the loos have low level flushes and use rain water. The LED lights and extractor fans are on motion sensors so there are no switches and no electricity wasted. The heater also cuts out if left on. Loo roll is recycled and ordered in bulk to reduce deliveries.

#### > THE KITCHENS:

They also have LED lights that are on motion sensors, no scrabbling around for light switches, and no electricity wasted either. We provide tea, coffee and sugar for guests all of which are fairtrade. Rather than disposable sponges/scourers, we provide washable scrubbies and washing up brushes with replaceable heads.

#### > COSY CABINS:

The cabins are really well insulated and have LED lights and Wi-Fi controlled heaters. This means we can pop the heaters on for arriving guests, ensuring the cabins are cosy, but also turn them off when guests leave. We ask guests to be considerate in their usage of the heaters - not leaving them on with the doors/windows open, when they go out etc. Little things make a big difference.

#### > OUTDOOR LIGHTS:

All our outdoor lights are on motion sensors and/or are solar powered. The pretty string lights are on a time switch so guests can turn them on. They'll stay on for about an hour and then go off so if you want them on for longer, just push the button that's between kitchen 1 and shower room 1.



#### > HOUSEKEEPING, CLEANING AND RECYCLING:

All our cleaning/laundry products, hand washes and shampoo/body washes are ecofriendly and refilled limiting our use of single use plastics and deliveries. We recycle as much as possible and encourage guests to do the same. We have separate collections for cardboard, glass, plastic and tins, and food.

Please do your bit by separating your waste/recycling and disposing of it in the correct bins.

#### > PLANTING AND WILDLIFE:

The Roost sits next to a stream and is surrounded by trees. We have planted native hedging around the perimeter of the site (800+ whips of different varieties including hazel, dog rose and hawthorn) along with lots of trees (including fruit trees). We are advocates of 'no mow' to encourage bees and insects so you won't find us strimming too often, just enough so you can still see the cabins. We have bird nesting boxes and bird feeders dotted around the site (all food is purchased from the RSPB) and a bat box.

#### > EV CHARGING:

We now have a dual EV charger so if you have an electric vehicle, you'll be able to charge it overnight.


#### > TRAIN TRAVEL:

Ok, so this isn't something we can take responsibility for but our proximity to the train station means guests don't have to travel by car. The village train station, Troedyrhiw, is a five minute walk away and connects to Cardiff, Merthyr Tydfil, Bridgend and Barry Island so why not bring your bike on the train? You can get to BikePark Wales in about 10-15 minutes by bike from the Roost, all off road. And, we're also on the Taff Trail (cycle route 8) part of which runs from Cardiff to Brecon so you could always cycle to us or stop off on the way through.

I think that's everything. If there's anything else you think we should be doing please tell us. Otherwise, we'll keep doing what we're doing to make the Roost as sustainable as we can whilst also making sure it's comfortable for guests all year round.




## 3. ROOST MAP

Your arrival information will confirm which shower room and kitchen you have been allocated. The shower rooms and drying room require codes to enter.







## 5. ANY PROBLEMS/IN CASE OF EMERGENCY

#### IN CASE OF EMERGENCY CALL 999.

If you have any problems, please contact us in the first instance on 07484 697392. An alternative number is 07484 605272.

In the event of a fire leave everything behind & get everyone out.

- Keep calm & get everyone out quickly & safely
- Report to the assembly point by the main gate
- Alert other guests & sound the alarm located at the fire assembly point by the main gate
- Call 999

Cabins are fitted with smoke alarms. There are fire extinguishers in each cabin and in the kitchens where there are also fire blankets.

Basic first aid kits can be found in the cabins and kitchens.

**Power outage:** If the power goes out, in the first instance, check the fuse box in your cabin (located in the 'porch' and, in Arosfa, by the double doors). If that's not the problem, please call us.

 An emergency torch/light is provided – when not in use, please ensure it is plugged in and switched on at the plug so that it can charge and is ready should you need it.

## 6. WiFi

BT Guest WiFi, no password required. This reaches most areas of the site but tends to be best around the kitchen and can be affected by the weather.

## 7. CHECKING OUT

#### Check out by 11:00 at the latest.

We are a small team and only have a short window to complete changeovers.

Before you leave:

- Make sure you've got all your belongings & don't leave anything behind.
  - Check the fridge, shower rooms, under the bed, drying room etc. Please don't leave food, drinks, toiletries etc.
- Empty any rubbish and recycling from the kitchen, cabin/s and shower room into the main bins (by the gate)
- Remove and bag up bedding
- Clean the bbq if used
- Turn off the cabin lights and heater
- Lock the cabin, returning the key to the key safe.




## 8. STAYING IN A CABIN

- Base sheets and mattress protectors are provided as standards, duvets and pillows with covers are an optional extra.
- Only use small appliances in the power/USB sockets or you may overload the system.
- A torch/emergency light is provided. When not in use as a torch please leave this plugged in and switched on as it will then come on in the event of a power outage.
- Touch on/off battery powered lights are provided by each bed, please don't leave these on for long periods.
- Arosfa has an ensuite shower room and kitchenette.
- Cabin heaters:
  - don't leave these on when you're out or doors/windows are open
  - please think about your usage too as <u>electricity is v expensive</u>
  - guests currently have full control over the heaters but excessive use may result in us restricting this.

## USING THE HEATER

Adjust the temperature and switch the heater on/off using the panel on the front





Please turn the heater off before you go out for the day/leave.

Keep the temp below 23°C. The cabins heat up quickly if the windows/doors are closed. Its ok to leave them on a low temp overnight (12°C should keep things cosy).



Please don't put anything on/over the heater, especially wet things (use the drying room). It's an electric heater so this is <u>very</u> <u>dangerous</u>.



## 9. STAYING IN YOUR VAN

- As a campervan guest, you will have been allocated a kitchen and shower room
- Please park your van in the booked space next to the sign/hook-up:
   pitch A is on the left hand side by the trees
- pitch A is on the right hand side of the rear of the kitchen/shower block
- Please be considerate to other guests when parking
- Electric hook-ups are provided subject to a fair use policy and we reserve the right to request payment for excessive use.

## 10. THE GATES - GETTING IN/OUT OF THE ROOST + PARKING

- Getting in/out by car enter code 1 (the main gate code) as per your arrival info email. To exit by car, enter the same code you used to get in (code 1); the keypad is just to the right of the main gate, on the side gate (we want to stop unwanted visitors leaving the site without a code).
- Getting in/out on foot or by bike to open the side gate from either side, enter code 2 as per your arrival information email
- Please park facing the big rocks on the right hand side and be considerate to other guests when parking

**Dual EV charger** – this is available for guests to use and we will have/can send you all the information you need to do this. Please contact us for information.

## **11. THE KITCHENS**

Your arrival information email will confirm which kitchen you have been allocated (the plan on p5 shows the locations of the kitchens). Please only use the kitchen allocated to you.

Each kitchen has a sink, fridge, microwave, kettle, toaster, two ring hob and a variety of cooking equipment/utensils plus crockery/cutlery.

- Please wipe round and empty the fridge/bins before you leave. Don't leave unwanted food, drink etc.
- Make sure you turn the hob rings off; they quite often get left on.
- BBQs and BBQ tools are provided, you will need to use your own charcoal and clean it when finished.

For groups, the wall between kitchen 1+2 can be rolled up to make a large kitchen. The outer walls of the kitchens can also be left open for ventilation. They can also be rolled up carefully.

## 12. WATER

The water in the kitchens and shower rooms is drinking water.

The water from the outside taps/hose/bike wash is **NOT** suitable for drinking as they use rainwater from our rainwater storage tanks. The loos flush with rainwater when we get it so it might look a funny colour.

Please don't waste water. The rainwater tanks can sometimes run dry (it doesn't rain as much as you might think) so please only use what you need when washing your bikes.



## 13. RECYCLING + RUBBISH

We are trying to make the Roost as sustainable as possible and would appreciate your help with this. The recycling/rubbish bins are split as follows:

- General waste non recyclable stuff
- Recycling cardboard, glass, metal cans and plastic
- Food waste please use the small compost caddy bin.

The main bins are situated by the side gate.

Please put your recycling in to the relevant bins. We quite often have to sift through the rubbish/recycling due to some guests putting stuff in the wrong bins as the council won't take it. Not a nice job.

### 14. SHOWER ROOMS

You will be allocated a shower room (see plan  $\rho$ 5). They are located on either side of the kitchen.

- You need a code to access your shower room; this is in your arrival info email.
- The light and fan will go on/off automatically, turn the heater on/off using the cord.
- The loos flush with rainwater so the water can sometimes look a funny colour.
- We provide handwash, hand towels, toilet roll, a bath mat and anti bac spray.
- Please dispose of sanitary waste in the paper bags provided and then into the bin.
- Don't flush anything other than loo paper.
- We will clean the shower rooms prior to arrival but not during your stay.

## 15. DRYING ROOM + WASHING LINES

There is a small, shared drying room. Instructions on how to use this are on the wall in the drying room.

There are also washing lines and pegs. Please don't dry anything on the cabin heaters as this is a fire risk.

## 16. BIKE WASH + MAINTENANCE AREA

Behind the side gate and the rubbish/recycling area, there is a bike wash area with clamp and brush. Please try not to waste water.

## 17. BBQs + FIRE BOWL

There is a shared fire bowl with seating. You can bring your own kiln dried wood or buy from us. Empty the ash into the bucket provided. Fires are not allowed anywhere else on the site.

There are a number of BBQs dotted about. Please feel free to use these. You'll need to bring your own charcoal, clean after use and put the cover back on.

Please be careful, especially in the summer, when things can be very dry.



## 18. PIZZA OVEN + PIZZA KITS

We now have a wood fired pizza oven. Please see the back rear of this info pack for more information on how to use the oven etc.

We are working on pizza kits so they are hopefully coming soon.

## 19. PETS

Well behaved pets/dogs are welcome so long as you clean up after them and they don't disturb other guests.

- There is a poo bin just outside the Roost; turn left out of the gate and the bin is to the right of the car park in front of the pub. There are poo bags on the fence by the facilities block.
- Please keep dogs off the beds
- Guests will be charged for any excessive cleaning or damage caused.

## 20. CCTV

We operate external CCTV systems which are recording on a continual basis. Images are stored in a secure system and under usual operational circumstances deleted after a period of one month.

The CCTV systems are provided as a service, and with our guests and their property in mind. Signage is in place to remind guests that CCTV systems are in operation. We use a qualified and reputable CCTV partner to maintain our systems.

## 21. FINALLY, ENJOY YOUR STAY AND PLEASE ...

#### Be considerate to other guests and the Roost's neighbours:

- Keep the noise right down between 22:00 and 07:30. We're a small site with neighbours and noise carries. If you're leaving early, please do so quietly.
- No smoking or vaping in or around the cabins or shared areas. The smoke gets into the cabins easily but it's not so easy to get the smell out. Please only smoke/vape in the car park where there is an ashtray/bucket (by the fire meeting point).
- Please dismount your bike in the car park and walk it through the site. Also give your bike a wash before storing it in your cabin.
- Tell us about any breakages, missing items or things not working so that we can replace/fix.



## 22. TROEDYRHIW + USEFUL STUFF NEARBY

The name of the village, Troed-y-rhiw, means 'foot of the slope' in Welsh and the Roost is located on a hill at the top of the village.

Troedyrhiw has a rich industrial heritage linked to the extraction of coal and iron ore in the 19 century. Built in c1830, Ash Villa (the house adjoining the Roost), and the neighbouring Dynevor Arms public house, originally formed part of a terrace of cottages facing the historic Glamorganshire canal which was used for transporting industrial goods from the Valleys to Cardiff docks.

The village centre is a five minute walk away (the quickest route is to walk down Ash Road, see green arrows below). Here you'll find pubs, two well-stocked shops, chemist, cashpoint (within the Londis), an Indian restaurant/takeaway (<u>Simply Indian</u>) and various takeaways.



The Dynevor Arms next door sometimes does food, shows the football and has a pool table. The Silver Bullet in the village also does food.

**Troedyrhiw train station**, a 5 minute walk away, connects directly to Merthyr Tydfil, Bridgend, Barry Island and Cardiff.

**Merthyr Tydfil town centre** can be reached by car (12 minutes); train from Troedyrhiw station (10 minutes) or bike (20 minutes on the Taff Trail). Here you'll find a wider choice of food and drink and shopping, a cinema and leisure centre.

There's a larger Co-op supermarket in Pentrebach (7 minutes by car, 10 minutes by bike) along with a Halfords. In Merthyr Tydfil you'll also find a Tesco Extra, Aldi and M&S.

## 23. CYCLING TO BIKEPARK WALES

#### BikePark Wales is 1.1 miles from the Roost, as the crow flies.

By car, its three miles and approximately 10 min away.

There are a few bike route options, off road.

Check out our video of how to get to BPW by bike.

#### 1. Via Ash Road – 15 min, 1.3 miles (7 min on the way back...)

Fyi, there's a footbridge with quite a few steps that you'll need to carry your bike up

- With the Dynevor Arms behind you, turn left and carry on up Ash Road (past the houses next to the pub not along the Taff Trail)
- Ash Road turns into a lane/path, follow this to a footbridge
- Go up and over the footbridge
- On the other side of the bridge turn right and follow the path/lane
- The lane comes out by the roundabout on the A470 that leads up to BPW
- Follow the main route up to BPW.

#### 2. Via the Taff Trail and Webbers Pond

- With the Dynevor Arms behind you, go left on to the Taff Trail (Gethin Street/National Cycle Route 8), not the lane past the houses next to the pub
- Follow the Taff Trail until you cycle underneath the A470
- Turn left on the other side of the bridge, following a loops and links trail




- Follow the trail up and to the right
- Take a left through an underpass (under the A470)
- The path bears left & follow to BPW
- You will (should!) come out on the road up to BPW.





#### Abergavenny / Y Fenni

This market town is famous for its food and cycling festivals. It's surrounded by stunning mountains - the Blorenge, the Sugar Loaf and the Skirrid, all of which are worth walking/cycling. There's a castle, canal walks and independent shops. The bar at the Angel Hotel is very cosy and does good food. Lots of other pubs and places to eat.

#### Cardiff / Caerdydd

The Welsh capital. There's a lot to see and do and it is well worth a visit. You can get the train there from Troedyrhiw in approximately 50 minutes. Alternatively you can drive there or cycle there on the Taff Trail (maybe get the train back).



#### Crickhowell / Crughywel

Picturesque Crickhowell has a castle, walks and cosy pubs. It's fiercely independent (no big chains here). There's an annual walking festival and the Green Man festival. Try the café in Book-ish for lunch and The Bear for cosy pub food. • www.visitcrickhowell.co.uk
